







TRACHYONYCHIA is a nail disorder characterized by brittle, thin, and yellowish nails. It is often associated with alopecia areata and can be a sign of an underlying autoimmune condition. The condition is not contagious and is not caused by a fungal infection. It is most commonly seen in women and can affect both hands and feet. The nails are typically thin and brittle, and may break easily. The skin around the nails may be red and irritated. The condition is usually treated with topical corticosteroids and nail care products. In severe cases, systemic corticosteroids may be used. The condition is usually self-limiting and may resolve on its own.
